

## Talk summary:

## Recognising God's voice and responding to his call [Jonah 4]

- 1. Jonah is angry with God because he forgives the people of Nineveh [Jonah 4: 1-4]
  - Jonah's seems to want God to punish the people of Nineveh rather than have mercy on them, even though he knows God's nature is to be gracious and compassionate. His response is not dissimilar to the older brother in the parable of the prodigal son. But the Lord replied "Have you have any right to be angry?"
- 2. <u>Jonah builds shelter, sits and watches what will happen to the city. A vine appears but is eaten the next day by a worm [Jonah 4: 5-8]</u>
  - Jonah is waiting to see what would happen to the city, he has even built a shelter
    for the show! He is very happy about the vine that gives shelter from the sun, but
    when it is destroyed by a worm he is so angry he wants to die. Jonah did not yet
    realise that God was for the whole world, not just for one group of people.
- 3. God teaches Jonah what the vine and the worm meant [Jonah 4: 9-11]
  - God speaks to Jonah through the vine and the worm. The vine was an
    unexpected gift from God. Jonah was enjoying the vine, but God sent the worm
    to destroy it, to highlight Jonah's selfish attitude. God used nature to get his
    message across to Jonah first though a big fish, then a tiny worm.
